Benefits: Each RA receives a stipend each semester. The current stipend is \$1,785.61 (pro-rated from start date), Fall 2005. RAs are guaranteed on-campus housing, for which they are financially responsible. Resident Advisors are allowed a single room at double occupancy rates when space is available. However, the Department of University Housing may assign roommates whenever the need arises. Equally important are the non-tangible benefits: the opportunity to interact with a variety of people and the chance to develop skills such as leadership, communication, organization, time management, and counseling.

10 Things College Students Should Know About Binge Drinking

1. Binge drinking is defined as five consecutive alcoholic drinks for a man, four for a woman.
2. More than **1,400** college students **die** each year in alcohol-related accidents.
3. Over **70,000** college-age students are **raped** or sexually assaulted each year in incidents involving alcohol.
4. Fighting increases when college students drink. More than **600,000** students a year are assaulted by another student who has been drinking.
5. About **25 percent** of college students say alcohol has led to lower grades.
6. **8 percent** of students (**400,000** people) report having mistakenly had unprotected sex when drinking.
6. More than **150,000** college students a year develop a health problem due to drinking.
7. About **300** students a year die from alcohol poisoning.
8. People who drink can still have fun without bingeing if they alternate alcoholic with non-alcoholic drinks.
9. Most college students do not binge drink. About **60 percent** say they drink moderately or not at all.



Introduction to University Housing Staff

University Housing works hard to make your residential experience enjoyable and beneficial for you. In order to meet this objective, there are several staff members who can assist you throughout the year. Most concerns you may have can be addressed by one of the following individuals:

Resident Advisor: Your Resident Advisor is an undergraduate student who lives on each floor to assist students with facility issues, roommate issues, maintain safety, enforce policy, plan social and educational programs and serve as a general resource to students.

Building Director: Each hall employs a graduate student or full-time Hall Director to oversee the operation of the building, supervise the RA staff, maintain safety, serve as a general resource, advise the hall Action Team, and assist students in various ways.

Coordinator of Residential Education: The campus is divided into two areas, Eagle Court and Southern Heights. There is one Coordinator for each of these areas who is a full-time staff member with a Master's degree. The Coordinator supervises all aspects of Residential Life in the buildings within their area.

Should you find that your concerns cannot be addressed by your Resident Advisor or Building Director, you should contact the Residence Education Office to speak with your Coordinator of Residence Education.
